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### 1. PURPOSE OF THE ORGANIZATION

Cowichan Valley Hospice Society is a non-profit community agency incorporated under the Society Act of British Columbia on April 15, 1981. It's purpose is to provide skilled and compassionate support services to the dying and bereaved and their families and friends, with sensitivity to their culture, values and beliefs.

The Society is registered as a Charity under the Income Tax Act (11887 8388 RR) and is therefore tax-exempt under section 149(1)(f).

### 2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The Society follows accounting principles which are generally accepted for non-profit organizations.

(a) Property, plant and equipment (see Note 5)

Property, plant and equipment are recorded at cost. Expenditures and additions which substantially increase the useful life of existing assets are capitalized. Amortization of these assets are based on the following rates:

Building	40 years straight-line
Furniture and fixtures	5 years straight-line
Office equipment	5 years straight-line
Computer equipment	3 years straight-line
Computer software	1 year straight-line

One-half of the year's amortization is recorded in the year of purchase and none in the year of disposal.

### (b) Fund accounting

The Society follows the deferral method of accounting for contributions. The Operating Fund reports unrestricted and restricted assets, liabilities, revenues and expenses related to the Society's activities. The Capital Asset Fund reports the ownership and equity related to the Society's capital assets.

### (c) Revenue recognition

The Society follows the deferral method of accounting for contributions. Restricted contributions and grants relating to the general operations of the Society are recognized in the Statement of Operations in the year in which the related expenses are incurred. Unrestricted contributions and grants that can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured are recorded as revenue in the Statement of Operations in the year received.

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### 2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (cont'd)

### (d) Use of estimates

The preparation of financial statements in accordance with Canadian Generally Accepted Accounting Principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the reporting period. Significant areas requiring the use of management estimates relate to the collectibility of accounts receivable, deferred revenue and provisions for contingencies. Actual results could differ from those estimates. Adjustments, if any, will be reflected in operations in subsequent fiscal periods.

### 3. FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

The Society's financial instruments consist of cash, accounts receivable, accounts payable and accrued liabilities, wages and benefits payable, and mortgage payable. For further information regarding these financial instruments please see Notes 4, 6, 7 and 8.

The financial instruments have been classified as follows:

### Held For Trading

Any financial instrument whose fair value can be reliably measured may be designated as held for trading on initial recognition of adoption of CICA 3856 Financial Instruments, even if that instrument would otherwise satisfy the definition of held for trading. The Society has classified the following assets and liabilities as held for trading: cash.

The Society's held for trading instruments are initially recognized at their fair value. Any gain/loss arising as a result of the difference between the carrying amount and their fair value is recognized in net income. Fair value is approximated by the instrument's initial cost in a transaction between unrelated parties. Transactions to purchase or sell these items are not recorded on the settlement date. Held for trading financial instruments are subsequently measured at their fair value. Net gains and losses arising from changes in fair value are recognized immediately in income.

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### 3. FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS (cont'd)

### Loans and Receivables

The Society has classified the following financial assets as loans and receivables: accounts receivable. The assets are initially recognized at their fair value. Fair value is approximated by the instrument's initial cost in a transaction between unrelated parties. Transactions to purchase or sell items are recorded on the settlement date. Total interest income, calculated using the effective interest rate method, is recognized in total income.

### Other Financial Liabilities

The Society has classified the following financial liabilities as other financial liabilities: accounts payable and accrued liabilities, wages and benefits payable, and mortgage payable. These liabilities are initially recognized at their fair value. Fair value is approximated by the instrument's initial cost in a transaction between unrelated parties. Transactions to purchase or sell these items are recorded on the settlement date. Total interest expense (if any) is calculated using the effective interest rate method and would be recognized in net income.

Unless otherwise noted, it is management's opinion that the Society is not exposed to significant interest or credit risks.

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### 9. DUNCAN DABBER BINGO SOCIETY DISTRIBUTIONS

The Duncan Dabber Bingo Society is operated by a Society of Registered Charities. This Society is responsible for all expenses and the net proceeds are distributed quarterly to participating organizations.

### 10. CHANGES IN ACCOUNTING FRAMEWORK AND ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The Canadian Institute of Chartered Accountants (CICA) Accounting Standards Board (ASB) has issued a new accounting framework applicable to Canadian not-for-profit organizations. Effective for fiscal years beginning January 1, 2012, not-for-profit organizations will be required to choose between International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS) and Accounting Standards for Not-for-Profit Organizations. Early adoption of these standards is permitted. The Cowichan Valley Hospice Society plans to adopt the new accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations for its fiscal year beginning January 1, 2012, however, the impact of this transition has not yet been determined.
